

Bwindi Impenetrable (where I live) Part of the Albertine Rift, cradle of humankind



1994: A Plea for Help

There are thousands of people dying. The Batwa pygmy tribe was evicted [from their rainforest home] ... and I need your help to resettle them.

- Bishop Livingstone Nkoyoyo to Diane Stanton, 1994



The Batwa or "Twa" forest people "The heart of their culture, traditions, beliefs and wealth swept away." - UOBDU

Original inhabitants of east-central African rainforest (indigenous)

Hunter-gatherers

Would trade with Bakiga outside the forest

Didn't engage in agriculture – not the cause of forest destruction

<1% of Uganda population


Three years earlier 1991

• To save mountain gorillas and encourage tourism, Uganda created Bwindi Impenetrable Nat Park, Mgahinga Gorilla NP & Echuya Central Forest Reserve



- Evicted the Batwa at gunpoint
- Eliminated former rights of all locals,
 Batwa and Bakiga, to enter forests to hunt,
 gather forest products






"Conservation Refugees"

- Evicting people for conservation has occurred on every continent (except Antarctica)
- US: in 1800s, Awaneechee Indians removed from ancestral lands in California to create Yosemite NP
- Estimated 14 million people evicted in Africa
- In 1991, the Batwa were given no land or compensation, and faced new diseases (HIV), vulnerability to alcohol addiction, discrimination

"[E]viction inevitably forces adults into intractable poverty, alcoholism, and prostitution, leaving their children with malnutrition, disease, and death." - Mark Dowie



Tragedy of the Commons

- Proposed by Garrett Hardin in Science, 1968: People will always selfishly take advantage of a commonly-used resource (pasture, ocean, forest)
- Led either to assigning monetary value to nature (Payment for Ecosystem Services) or "Fortress Conservation"
- Is it always true?

Lin Ostrom: Power to the People Turned Hardin's theory on its ear: Trust leads to cooperation

- She saw local/indigenous people sustainably managing natural resources
 without governments. How could this be?
- She determined how people's livelihoods & conservation can work in harmony: <u>"Trust" leads to cooperation</u>.
- Won the Nobel Prize in Economics in 2009

Lin Ostrom: A champion of empowering local people

- <u>Design Principles</u>: People need to have a voice in making, changing & enforcing rules of resource use.
- Local people, closest to the resource, will solve their problems if higher-level governments don't interfere.
- Her research led to "decentralized" conservation management in countries around the world: giving decision-making power to locals.

Prize exploring the next big idea in rainforest conservation announced

Mongabay.org, a non-profit that aims to raise awareness about social and environmental issues relating to tropical forests and other ecosystems, has announced the first winner of its environmental reporting prize its Special Reporting Initiative (SRI) program. The prize sought proposals to explore the question of what's the next big idea in tropical biodiversity conservation. After a two-month application window and a month of deliberations, this week an independent panel of journalists and tropical forest specialists selected environmental journalist Wendee Nicole as the first recipient of the Mongabay Prize for Environmental Reporting.

Ostrom Research on Batwa in Uganda

- Makarere University Prof. Abwoli Banana – who studied as a scholar under Ostrom - found that when Batwa people lived in the forest, illegal harvesting was lower than where Batwa were not present
- The Batwa self-monitored the forests, and poaching by outsiders was reduced.


Between 1994 - 2014

- Diane Stanton and Dallas Episcopal churches helped Batwa with Uganda churches for 2 decades
- Dr. Scott Kellermann, medical missionary surveyed the Batwa in 2000
 - Found 40% children dying before 5
 - Life expectancy 28 vs. 48 Uganda's gen pop
 - 18% infants died within a month
- Kellermanns:
 - Founded Bwindi Community Hospital in 2003
 - Created Batwa Development Program in 2008



Healthy Communities and Sustainable Ecosystems

What I Didn't Know Then

- High levels of violence among Batwa & toward Batwa child abuse, child neglect, spousal abuse, rape, murder
- Batwa have higher than average HIV rates (up to 40% in a village among single women) develops into AIDS due to not taking ARVs
- Alcoholism is consuming their lives
- Batwa young women engage in prostitution
- Prejudice and discrimination is common

In other words, I have a lot on my plate!

The Batwa Artisan Coop

- We buy at a fair trade price & resell in the US.
- Funds go to RSF and Batwa community development they decide (Ostrom) So far: Clean water, a bridge, mattresses, household items, education, health insurance
- Estimated 5-fold increase in their income
- We sell baskets online (Facebook page), and at The Woodlands Church Trading Co. Looking for more stores, and marketers to help sell them.

Child Sponsorship



- RSF initially got 3 Batwa boys who'd dropped from school in boarding school and they're doing GREAT. We took them on Safari as a reward!
- Better school attendance among Kalehe Batwa compared with the year before
- Another organization that used to sponsor all Batwa just dropped Kalehe village completely – We now sponsor all 15 kids (School year is Feb-Nov)
- \$120/year in local school; \$500/year for Bishop's boarding school.
